14 **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**

15 Ms. Christian made a motion to approve the minutes from meetings dated 2/25/09,
16 3/19/09, and 5/27/09 as presented. Mr. Masciola seconded the motion. Vote: Christian,
17 yes; Masciola, yes; Eckels, yes; Fisher, yes, abstain from 5/27/09. Motion carried,
18 minutes approved.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

- 21 ♦ Joe McGowan, 3294 Sunglow Dr., Lewis Center, OH 43035, said he moved to
22 Willow Springs North recently from Clintonville. He has heard there are plans to
23 build a trail around his neighborhood and Alum Creek and he would like to obtain
24 more information regarding this.
- 25 ♦ Mr. Overturf offered to provide more information to him.

AGENDA ITEMS

29 **“SHADES OF ORANGE” WATER FEATURE**

- 30 ♦ Mr. Fisher distributed information regarding a water feature. He heard from
31 somebody that near Lake Michigan there is a musical fountain where during the
32 warm weather months, a band plays music and there are dancing waters. Although
33 the concept is simple, busloads of people come to see these dancing waters and hear
34 the music.
- 35 ♦ Mr. Fisher said such the water feature could be a great attribute for Orange Township
36 and he suggested the name “Shades of Orange.” He does not intend to press the
37 matter but to the township powers-to-be he feels it is well worth consideration.
38 Somebody may find some kind of legal issue with the water feature but he is certain
39 such issues could be overcome with some effort.
- 40 ♦ Mr. Fisher said such a feature would be great for all of Orange Township, and he
41 noted that Orange Township businesses have gone out of their way to work on the
42 fourth of July race and parade, and this could help them if large numbers of people
43 come into the area.
- 44 ♦ Ms. Messmer asked if it would need to be somewhere where a band could come or if
45 it would be a feature of its own with piped-in music. Mr. Fisher said perhaps
46 something fairly small could start off at North Orange Park and the township could
47 see how successful it is prior to spending too much money. Such a feature would
48 differentiate Orange Township from the other townships in the area and it would be
49 really neat.
- 50 ♦ Mr. Masciola said it seems like a good idea. Ms. Eckels said a timed fountain exists
51 at the Easton Towne Center which does not have music, and she asked if Mr. Fisher
52 was considering such a feature. Mr. Fisher said perhaps something slightly grander
53 and which would play at night with lights; lighting is a large part of the feature as the
54 water changes color. Ms. Christian said she likes the idea and thanked Mr. Fisher for
55 bringing up the idea for consideration.

60 BIKE LANES DISCUSSION

- 61 ♦ Ms. Christian said that there have been prior discussions regarding painted bike lanes
62 on roadways, and that Mr. Overturf had asked that this be put on the agenda because
63 there are trails which may lend themselves to this approach.
- 64 ♦ Mr. Overturf said that the issue was originally brought up due to a discussion of
65 painting bike lanes on Highmeadows Village Drive. However perhaps just bike
66 symbols will be installed instead. He discussed the issue with Ms. Hugh and
67 considering the traffic flow and traffic rule, bicyclists will have to maintain use of
68 those rules. It would indicate a designated path for people to get from one area to
69 another. Installing lanes would suddenly restrict some things and would also cause
70 liability to the township which it may not desire.
- 71 ♦ Thus, it makes sense to him to paint symbols on both sides of the roads on
72 Highmeadows Village Drive. This wouldn't be done in many areas, but that area
73 lends itself to that because it leads from Riverbend Avenue to Highbanks Metro Park.
74 Perhaps in the future similar action could be taken on Walker Woods Boulevard
75 because it ties in some things on Powell Road.
- 76 ♦ Ms. Christian confirmed that he was suggesting using symbols instead of actual
77 painted lanes. Mr. Fisher said that perhaps signs would be better than something
78 written on the streets, because cars may expect bikes to only be in the areas where the
79 marks are on the pavement; however, parked cars on the road will result in bikes
80 having to go around the parked car.
- 81 ♦ Mr. Overturf said traffic rules will dictate the use of the areas, not what is indicated
82 on the signage, which will be directional in nature. Also, the township doesn't want
83 to install many signs because people don't like signs in their yards.
- 84 ♦ Mr. Masciola said it seems that they did good research and it has been well thought-
85 out. He likes the idea of signs not throughout the route but perhaps at the beginning
86 and end. Mr. Overturf said that the information would indicate where the trails lead
87 to.

88
89 RESIDENT FOLLOW-UP FROM SURVEY RESULTS

- 90 ♦ Ms. Christian said that a township-wide community survey was sent out as part of the
91 Master Park Plan Update process, and some residents responded indicating that they
92 would like to be involved and volunteer. Ms. Messmer has provided her with this list,
93 and all but two people provided their email address. Ms. Christian suggested that an
94 email be crafted thanking them for their interest, providing updated information
95 including items such as the pool expansion, etc. which have transpired in direct
96 response to feedback from the residents and stating that their names will be kept on
97 file in the event that there is an opportunity for them to get involved.

98
99 MUSIC IN THE PARK (FOLLOW-UP DISCUSSION)

- 100 ♦ Ms. Christian said that Music in the Park has been discussed in the past by the
101 OTCPB and it will be discussed again tonight by Mr. Fisher.
- 102 ♦ Mr. Fisher said he wanted to provide a reminder that Music in the Park has been
103 discussed in the past so it doesn't become a dead subject. He is aware that it couldn't
104 be done at the Township Hall and Park, but North Orange Park is a possibility and
105 one of the music directors at Orange High School stated that he could provide the
106 band for that if desired.
- 107 ♦ Mr. Fisher said this is just a matter of organizing this and doing it, and Orange
108 Township is one of the few entities in this area that doesn't do any music program at
109 all. He noted that there would be no cost to the township.
- 110 ♦ Ms. Messmer said the band director has not contacted anyone at the township yet.
111 Mr. Fisher said the township was supposed to contact him. Ms. Messmer said, "No,
112 he was to contact us" the last time she spoke with him. Mr. Fisher asked whether she
113 had been in contact with her and when. Ms. Messmer said she was not sure whether
114 the band director's idea died or whether he has been busy doing other things.
- 115 ♦ Mr. Fisher said it was not the band director's idea, it was his idea and he had
116 contacted him about the idea. Ms. Messmer said something had changed after that
117 conversation. The idea was alive for a while but she doesn't know where it stands

118 now. Mr. Fisher said there are three different high schools in the area and at least one
119 of the bands from those schools would probably be interested. Ms. Messmer said she
120 would talk about it regarding what they expect and need.

121 ♦ Ms. Eckels asked if there was a method to let the public know about this. Mr. Fisher
122 said it could be done through the website and newspaper. Ms. Christian said the
123 school could also use its existing channels through parents to spread the word, and
124 she felt that the concept was a great idea.

125

126 HOA PRESENTATION STATUS

127 ♦ Ms. Christian said that Mr. Katz will be sharing the revised homeowners' association
128 presentation with the other trustees for their approval.

129 ♦ Ms. Christian said that in order to move ahead with the homeowners' association
130 presentations, because the pamphlet was more detailed and required using an outside
131 printer, it has been suggested that the PowerPoint information will be presented and
132 left with homeowners' associations, as well as a trail map which will be in an easy-to-
133 read format and which will include the location of the township's current parks. The
134 pamphlet is not gone forever but this way the homeowners' associations can proceed
135 at this time.

136 ♦ Ms. Christian said that she will communicate via email with the Board members
137 regarding whether they have a preference for which homeowners' associations they
138 wish to visit, such as their own.

139 ♦ Mr. Katz publicly commended Ms. Eckels for her efforts into the pamphlet. Ms.
140 Eckels said that Ms. Christian and Mr. Katz also helped, and that she enjoyed the
141 process. She will get the final edits to Mr. Katz.

142

143 TRAIL DESIGN SUGGESTIONS

144 ♦ Ms. Eckels commended everybody who has been involved in trail design. She has
145 heard many positive comments from her neighborhood regarding their use of the
146 trails, and her family uses it every night. The trails enhance communication
147 throughout the community and they are doing a wonderful thing for all the
148 homeowners.

149 ♦ Ms. Eckels said that she has heard comments from several homeowners and she
150 wished to share this information with the Board, and she also wished to provide more
151 information regarding the design of bike paths and her experience through her job
152 with this.

153 ♦ Ms. Eckels said the township's bike paths are restricted to historical farm land and
154 much of it is open, not well-wooded and has few large riparian zones against creeks,
155 etc. There are also many restrictions on the township's bike paths including
156 easements, power lines, etc. and those items are unsightly and also difficult to hide.
157 The trails are restricted to roadway easements and she thinks the township has dealt
158 with many of the restrictions very well in regards to building the paths and making
159 them accessible to the community.

160 ♦ Ms. Eckels said that she has heard comments regarding the design of the trails being
161 very straight and not well-wooded or protected, which is related to the above-
162 mentioned situations. She has discussed with people that the township is limited in
163 regards to what it can do. She has traversed different paths outside the township
164 because they are well-wooded, including the Scioto River and Alum Creek paths.
165 These paths are particularly enjoyable because they meander and are heavily wooded
166 with nice scenery, but those are not available in the township. This is an important
167 item to add to paths and although there are concerns about tree root damage, there are
168 engineering controls and barriers which can be installed which stop the tree roots
169 from growing there, but they must be installed at the time the tree is planted. Adding
170 a meandering nature and trees to paths also adds aesthetically pleasing aspects.

171 ♦ Ms. Eckels said she is aware that the easements must be a certain width and that it is
172 difficult to get a path to meander within that width, but when that option is available
173 it would be a nice feature to have; fast-growing trees and high bushes are nice
174 features which the community would like. She said a tree-planting day could be held,
175 and said she has done several of those in Westerville. This can be done inexpensively
176 by having volunteers digging out saplings from a heavily-wooded community area

- 177 and moving them to the bike path area. The community feels more involved when
178 then get involved in events such as tree planting days, and that would be nice to have
179 on Arbor Day.
- 180 ◆ Ms. Eckels said that trees help reduce the reflective heat on the paths. During the
181 summer, from 11:00 AM to 5:00 PM people don't use the township paths and this is
182 mostly due to the fact that the trails have limited shading. As an alternative people
183 use the Alum Creek and Scioto River paths.
 - 184 ◆ Ms. Eckels said that signs have been discussed before by this Board, and she noted
185 that most trails in the area have trail rules which are posted, and that does take money,
186 but some include speed restrictions, animal waste, shared path courtesy, and the new
187 helmet requirement in Columbus which started yesterday, requiring all children under
188 age 17 to wear helmets when biking. She said the township could adopt trail rules if
189 desired, including such a helmet rule.
 - 190 ◆ Ms. Hugh said that the township park rules are posted at each park. Ms. Eckels asked
191 if they included trail rules. Mr. Overturf said they did. Mr. Barbosky said speed
192 restrictions were not included. Mr. Overturf asked why speed restrictions were
193 necessary, as no motorized vehicles are permitted on township trails. Ms. Eckels said
194 that the restriction in Columbus is 15 MPH, which gets the fast bikers off the paths.
195 Posting trail rules helps users to acknowledge courtesy.
 - 196 ◆ Ms. Hugh said that requiring helmets for children is a great safety idea, but she didn't
197 know how it could be enforced. For example, there is currently an issue regarding
198 violations of the catch and release requirement on township properties regarding
199 whether the sheriff's office or ODNR would enforce that. The sheriff's office cannot
200 patrol the paths and doing so is not ODNR's responsibility, so although the rule could
201 be put into place it would be difficult to enforce.
 - 202 ◆ Ms. Eckels said that Columbus paths are mostly away from the roads and harder to
203 see, whereas Orange Township's paths are open and close to the road. She noted that
204 the fine is \$15 per citation in Columbus. Ms. Hugh said that would be a sheriff's
205 deputy issue and she will discuss the issue with them. Ms. Eckels asked her to find
206 out if they were looking into that now since the regulation has gone into effect in
207 Columbus.

DESIGN OPTIONS

- 210 ◆ Ms. Eckels said that regarding design options, she did a project in Canal Winchester
211 on pervious concrete, which she provided a sample of. She looks into environmental
212 design in any project and also considers the cost issues. Pervious concrete and
213 asphalt are cost efficient materials. Pervious concrete is laid like concrete, and storm
214 water retention is beneath it so above-ground ponds are necessary; the pond is located
215 underground. The material allows the water to trickle down to the aquifer and it
216 doesn't have to be discharged into a stream.
- 217 ◆ Ms. Eckels displayed a photo of the project road in Canal Winchester which had
218 pervious concrete used as side road parking. Ms. Hugh said she has done a lot of
219 research into this material. When she lived in Denver this material was looked into
220 because detention areas are so expensive. Denver has a different climate and she
221 bought into it there, but it has not been used enough in Ohio. When she worked for a
222 private development firm in Ohio, which owned Westland Mall, she looked into it for
223 that project. She didn't recommend using it now until it has been proven in Ohio's
224 climate, as the material is pervious and holds water and there are so many freeze/thaw
225 cycles that the material needs to be proved first here.
- 226 ◆ Ms. Eckels said that her company has installed this material at The Ohio State
227 University as well, and many communities in this area are beginning to use it. The
228 City of Hilliard is installing the material as concrete gutters so the water doesn't have
229 to travel to a catch basin; it just goes straight into the ground. It has low strength so it
230 is not good for heavy loads, but a bike trail would be a good application is one is
231 trying to move water from a low-lying area. She has seen it used frequently in
232 parking lots, including at Target, and she explained that parking lots are notoriously
233 bad ponding areas. It would not be desirable on roadways where there is a lot of ice
234 scraping.

- 235 ♦ Ms. Hugh said she would contact Ms. Eckels and have an off-line conversation
236 regarding this. She would like to become familiar with such projects in the area so
237 she can keep an eye on it; she is interested in the material.
- 238 ♦ Mr. Fisher said that the parking lot at the Dublin Ohio 43017 post office is a good
239 example of where the material has been used. However, it is not a good application
240 because of the co-efficient of hardness which is hard on joints for runners and
241 walkers. Ms. Eckels said that the material is also bumpy; however, an asphalt
242 application has now been created to address these issues. This would be good for
243 non-vehicle applications.
- 244 ♦ Ms. Eckels explained that a 4' deep sand layer is placed beneath it which will serve as
245 retention, and it is slowly released into the ground. The material can be colored any
246 color desirable, which can reduce heat impact, such as brown or beige, and that helps
247 with the environmental impact and heat index. She has seen it used on rooftops as
248 well.
- 249 ♦ Ms. Eckels said that the parks system in Orange Township is still at an infant age and
250 there is a lot of growth potential, so this is good to keep in mind for future design
251 options which the community might like and which may enhance the environment or
252 lessen the impacts. This is especially true if it is found that there is not enough space
253 for retention at the community center.
- 254 ♦ Ms. Eckels noted that water which is released off of asphalt is very hot and when it is
255 released into a stream it the habitat of the fish and other wildlife is affected.
256 Temperatures have increased in streams in this area due to the increase of asphalt
257 development.
- 258 ♦ Ms. Christian said this is excellent information and she thanked Ms. Eckels for the
259 information and the sample, as she had never heard of this material. She liked her
260 ideas regarding Arbor Day tree planting, and part of Ms. Hugh's role will be to look
261 at how things are done in the community.
- 262 ♦ Mr. Overturf said that regarding the design of trails and trees, there will be a trail in
263 the wooded area in Alum Creek. He noted that some people don't want trails through
264 the wooded areas near their homes.

PARK BOARD MEETING SCHEDULE

- 267 ♦ Ms. Christian said that last November, this Board's meetings changed from being
268 once per month to every other month; however, there have already been many
269 meetings this year. Ms. Knapp noted that this is the 7th month of the year and this is
270 the 8th meeting this year because in addition to regular meetings there have been
271 strategic planning meetings and trail building seminars. Ms. Christian noted that
272 board members have also spent much time on other projects outside of regular and
273 special meetings. She asked how the Board felt the current meeting schedule was
274 working.
- 275 ♦ Ms. Eckels asked whether the length of the meetings has increased since they were
276 changed to every other month. Ms. Christian said that it has sometimes but not every
277 time. Ms. Knapp said they were typically 2.5-3.25 hours long. Mr. Masciola said the
278 meetings have been longer than they were but not twice as long.
- 279 ♦ Mr. Masciola said that he felt enough is being done every other month, and that his
280 biggest concern with going every other month had been that doing so could delay the
281 critical path of events which must happen for a project to be completed. However,
282 the Board has been able to meet when necessary.

TRUSTEE LIAISON REPORT

- 285 ♦ Mr. Katz provided the following information:
 - 286 ✓ On 6/2/09 he and township attorney Mike McCarthy met with the Northpoint
287 Meadows homeowners' association board and its management company. This
288 subdivision is located right around the Del-Co Water tower and points south. He
289 asked these entities to reaffirm the easement commitments which had already
290 been received from their predecessor, Maronda Homes, who turned over
291 everything to the homeowners' association since those affirmations had been
292 made, and the easements had not yet been recorded. Many requests were made of
293 the township, many of which could not possibly be accommodated, but the

- 294 township did offer to look into some. Mr. Overturf was offered to walk the
 295 property with the representatives.
- 296 ✓ On 6/10/09 he learned that official approval has been received from Delaware
 297 County regarding the township’s desire to build a trail in the right-of-way along
 298 Owenfield Drive from Powell Road to Hidden Ravines Drive, progressing to the
 299 traffic light at Hidden Ravines Drive and Route 23 across from the GFS store.
 300 Mr. Overturf has completed the bid book for that construction.
 - 301 ✓ The Gooding Boulevard Extension, which extends the trail from North Orange
 302 Park to the location of the new Delaware County District Library will be added as
 303 an alternate of the Owenfield Trail bid book. The bid book will be presented to
 304 the trustees at its next meeting on 8/3/09, and it will be advertised for bids for two
 305 weeks, the bid will be awarded, and construction will begin and is expected to
 306 take about one month.
 - 307 ✓ An easement is necessary from Suburban Gas on its exclusive easement on a
 308 small piece of property just north of the Dominion Homes/Glen Oak park area
 309 and just south of the Del-Co Water Company Easements. He and Mr. McCarthy
 310 are working diligently on this matter and he will be meeting with them face-to-
 311 face.
 - 312 ✓ At the 6/15/09 Regular Trustee Meeting, that board approved the Active Glen
 313 Oak Park conceptual design drawings from Raugh and Associates, and also a
 314 purchase order was approved for \$15,200.00.
 - 315 ✓ Several days later he and Mr. Overturf drove the length of the Owenfield Drive
 316 property from slightly north of Powell Road to Hidden Ravines drive, in order to
 317 determine where the path would run and where the crossovers were need to run
 318 down the east side of the drive, then crossing over at the southern edge of the
 319 Meijer parking lot to run the west side of the drive all the way up to Hidden
 320 Ravines Drive. Mr. Overturf confirmed that the trail won’t lead all the way south
 321 to Powell Road.
 - 322 ✓ He and Mr. Overturf walked the North Orange Trail through Summerfield Village
 323 east of the new Glen Oak Park property and ending on trillium drive. The
 324 Northpoint Meadows subdivision had some concerns about the trail behind their
 325 property and the proximity to their homes, privacy issues, etc. He had suggested
 326 that these residents walk the North Orange Trail to see the quality of work the
 327 township has done, how close to the homes that trail is, and the fact that there is
 328 no fencing or mounding and there are no problems.
 - 329 ✓ He and Mr. Overturf looked at the Glen Oak Park property and discussed some
 330 features they may want to see there. The next day he and Ms. Hugh drove the
 331 Gator through the same trail and he took photos. He, Ms. Hugh, and Mr. Overturf
 332 also walked down to the Northpoint Meadows perimeter where the township
 333 hopes to build its trail, and he took photos attempting to capture the distance to
 334 the trail from the homes. He sent the pictures to the Northpoint Meadows
 335 homeowners’ association.
- 336 • Ms. Christian said that the path ~~along the railroad tracks in that area~~ was
 337 installed by the developer ~~is along the railroad tracks on the outside of the~~
 338 ~~fence on the inside of the fence and along the tracks~~, and Mr. Aumiller ~~has had~~
 339 stated in the past that it would have been nice if the trail was ~~installed inside~~
 340 ~~the fence instead. n’t outside the fence.~~ She asked ~~if whether it would be~~
 341 ~~possible there was a possibility to to ensure ensure~~ that future trails ~~were are~~
 342 built ~~outside inside of~~ the fence ~~next to neighborhoods~~. Mr. Katz said he
 343 could think of arguments for both sides of the concept. Ms. Hugh said the
 344 fence serves as a delineation of the residents’ property lines from the open
 345 space.
 - 346 • Mr. Katz said that the process of obtaining easements in this situation has had
 347 to be started all over again. He asked Mr. McCarthy about why the easements
 348 were not recorded, and he found that it had to do with saving money.
 349 Batching things together to go to the court rather than multiple times saves
 350 money. However, when Mr. Katz considered all the time and effort that must
 351 be expended now to obtain the easement, he has asked that in the future,
 352 easements are immediately recorded. This cannot happen again.

- 353 ✓ On 6/23/09 he, Mr. McCarthy, Mr. Overturf, and representatives of the
- 354 Northpoint Meadows homeowners' association walked the property. He and Mr.
- 355 Overturf had previously discussed moving a portion of the front trail which runs
- 356 parallel to East Orange Road further north and away from the homes' property
- 357 lines. Mr. Overturf had made the suggestion of running the trail at a 45 degree
- 358 angle for this purpose and the residents seemed to like that idea, so new drawings
- 359 were created and emailed to these residents.
- 360 ✓ On 6/24/09 he met with Mr. Overturf to discuss the projects they wish to
- 361 complete by the end of 2009, including:
- 362
- 363 1) Owenfield Trail
- 364 2) Leveling/dirt movement at the Glen Oak Park property (the ball fields will
- 365 not be completed until spring)
- 366 3) The Lewis Center Rail Trail, including Glen Oak and the Del-Co Water
- 367 Easements (The Northpoint Meadows and Villages of Oak Creek
- 368 easements will not be built out until next year)
- 369 4) The North Orange Aquatic Center Pool Addition.
- 370
- 371 • Mr. Fisher asked if it was possible that the Lewis Center Trail Extension could
- 372 be completed this year. Mr. Barbosky and Mr. Katz said it may be possible
- 373 depending on the events which occur.
- 374 ✓ At the 5/25/09 Trustee Special Meeting an easement donation was accepted from
- 375 Park Place Village at North Orange Condominiums. The trail had already been
- 376 built by Bob Webb and the condo association agreed to donate an easement to the
- 377 township on their already-built trail. The township had previously built a
- 378 connector piece to that trail.
- 379 ✓ On 6/29/09 he met with P.K. Tudor of the Del-Co Water Company and the
- 380 township received the easements the township had requested. The documents
- 381 have been sent to Delaware County and court approval has been received, and he
- 382 will request at the next trustee meeting on 8/3/09 to accept the easements, which
- 383 can then be recorded by the county recorder.
- 384 ✓ He met on 7/8/09 with Mr. Overturf again, and he stated that the bid books and
- 385 drawings reference in the books for the Owenfield Trail and the Gooding
- 386 Boulevard extension as an alternate are now ready. Bid books and drawings for
- 387 the North Orange Trail Phase II are now ready as well.
- 388 ✓ Bid books and drawings for the Glen Oak Park project should be ready at the
- 389 beginning of September.
