Orange Township Fire Chief Tom Stewart Retires

In September 2000, the Orange Township Board of Trustees hired Tom S. Stewart to be their new Fire Chief. The Trustees needed a Fire Chief who could take the fire department to the next level, and meet the Township's ever increasing growth and demands. Chief Stewart was hired to take on the challenge, bringing over 27 years of fire department experience to Orange Township.

Chief Stewart began his fire service career with the Hilliar Township - Centerburg Fire Department in 1973, and advanced through the ranks to become their fire chief. In 1985, Chief Stewart was hired by Perry Township Fire Department where he was later promoted to Lieutenant. Until 1990, when he was hired by Liberty Township Fire Department - Powell, Chief Stewart served as Fire Chief of Centerburg and a Lieutenant of Perry Township Fire Department. While at Liberty Township, Chief Stewart assisted in the transformation of an all-volunteer organization to a career/combination department. He left Liberty Township as an Assistant Fire Chief when he was hired by Orange Township.

Upon being hired by Orange Township, the Trustees asked Chief Stewart to oversee a multitude of projects in order to upgrade its existing fire department structure. Some of the larger projects included renovating the fire station located at the corner of South Old State Road and Orange Road; transitioning to a full paramedic transport service; building the department's second station on Gooding Boulevard; doubling the department staffing; and replacing aging apparatus and equipment. In the 13-1/2 years that Chief Stewart has been with Orange Township, all these projects, and more, were completed.

Chief Stewart worked for Battelle Memorial Institute in Columbus from 1967 to 1969 before joining the armed services. He served in the United States Marine Corp from 1969 to 1973 until he was honorably discharged. After leaving the Marine Corps, Chief Stewart went back to work for Battelle from 1973 to 1985 serving in the capacity of conference planning coordinator. While a member of the fire service, Chief Stewart has served as the Ohio Fire Chiefs' Association (OFCA) Emergency Response System Coordinator for Delaware County; OFCA *In Command* Magazine Publication Committee Chair; Central Ohio Fire Chiefs' Association President; Delaware County Fire Chiefs' Association President; American Red Cross Delaware Chapter Board Member; and Delaware County Health Department - Friends for Life Board

Member. In addition to serving for many organizations, Chief Stewart was also a presenter for the International Association of Fire Chiefs' at two international conferences in which he discussed fire station planning and design, and how to incorporate training into fire station design.

Chief Stewart has played instrumental roles in the fire service from the local level to the international level, and his knowledge and leadership have benefitted many fire departments and their personnel. After 41 years of service to the citizens of Central Ohio, and 13-1/2 years to those in Orange Township, Chief Stewart's work is finished. Fighting the good fight, the Maltese cross has gained new luster from his dedicated efforts. The fire service will forever greet Chief Tom S. Stewart in the sacred bond of public safety.

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“Road Rules” of Modern Roundabouts

A modern roundabout is a circular, unsignalized intersection where entering traffic yields to motorists circulating around a central island.

Motorists

- When approaching a roundabout, **slow down**.
- Be cautious of pedestrians as you approach the crosswalk.
- Vehicles must yield to pedestrians in the crosswalk and to motorists already in the roundabout
- Vehicles within the roundabout have the right-of-way.
- All movement within the roundabout is counterclockwise.
- When traveling within the roundabout, only stop to avoid a collision. You have the right-of-way over entering traffic.
- When circulating within a multilane roundabout, avoid changing lanes.
- Give special consideration to trucks, trailers and other large vehicles within a roundabout. Avoid passing or driving adjacent to larger vehicles within the roundabout. Large vehicles often need more than one lane to circulate the roundabout.
- Use caution, be courteous, and share the road when encountering cyclists.
- Continue through the roundabout until you reach your exit. Use your turn signal when exiting.
- As you exit the roundabout, be aware of pedestrians crossing the roadway.

If an emergency vehicle approaches the roundabout...

- directly behind you just prior to you entering the roundabout(single lane approach): Enter the roundabout and travel to your exit. After exiting the roundabout, immediately maneuver your vehicle to the right side of the road to allow the emergency vehicle to pass you. **Do not stop** in the roundabout.
- on another approach prior to you entering the roundabout: Wait for the emergency vehicle to enter and exit the roundabout before proceeding with your maneuver.
- while you are circulating within the roundabout: Exit the roundabout and immediately maneuver your vehicle to the right side of the road to allow the emergency vehicle to pass you. **Do not stop** in the roundabout.


Cyclists

- Approach in the bicycle lane if one is provided
- If a walking/bike path is provided around the perimeter of the roundabout, cyclists can either enter the roundabout as a vehicle or exit the roadway to use the path.
- Cyclists must yield to both pedestrians and vehicles already in the roundabout.
- Travel at or near the same speed as motorists within the roundabout. Ride in the center of you lane, not on the right curb line.
- Use proper hand signals prior to exiting the roundabout.

Pedestrians

- Cross only at marked crosswalks, always stay on the designated walkway, and never cross to the central island.
- Cross the roundabout one approach at a time. Use the splitter island as a refuge area before crossing the remaining lanes.

One of the questions I always ask residents of Orange Township is: Do they like living here? I almost always hear a resounding "Yes!" Overwhelmingly, they comment on our parks and the quality of life they feel they have here. I saw that response evident in the passage of our Parks and Recreation Levy renewal in November. The passage of that levy will ensure the continued maintenance of our beautiful parks, swimming pools, trails, and also the addition of future parks and trails. Our park department has been instrumental in obtaining grants that keep our levy working longer and accomplishing more projects. Beth Hugh, our Maintenance and Parks Director recently worked hard on a major grant for \$258,000 for the E. Powell Road trail that will be coming soon. This was a great accomplishment! The E. Powell Road Trail will run between Oak Creek and South Old State. We also received two grants for \$177,477.00 for phase 2 of the Graphics Way Trail and \$150,000 for phase 3 of the same trail. In 2014 we will see the completion of the Walker Wood Park on Walker Wood Boulevard, the completion of the Pedestrian Bridge over U.S. Route 23, phase 2 and phase 3 of the Graphics Way Trail, that will connect to the Pedestrian Bridge on the east side. We will also see the completion of a community center study and an opportunity for you to decide if you want a community center in Orange Township.

Our fire department received 1,836 calls for service in 2013. Of those calls, 885 were Fire/Rescue/Medic Assist calls and 951 were EMS calls. We also received a very good ISO rating. For commercial properties, a rating of 3 and for residential properties, a rating of 4. Our ISO rating is an analysis of our fire suppression services that can impact property owners insurance providing for the possibility of better rates on premiums. Orange Township has a better ISO rating than most areas in the country. Our fire department has also worked diligently in bringing down the costs of running the fire department. With the assistance of our firefighters and staff, a new bargaining agreement was reached and Orange Township realized a savings of over \$470,000 from March to December 2013. We have the best safety services because we expect the best and they deliver on a daily basis.

Our maintenance and road crews have amazed us this year dealing with a very harsh winter. They have worked tirelessly plowing our roads, taking great pride in the appearance and safety of our community and striving to be cost effective. We have more road work planned this summer and will continue to plan for future road improvements to benefit your travels through the community. One of the major road improvements that is currently in process is adding turn lanes on Orange Rd. at the U.S. Route 23/Orange Road intersection. I know we will all be glad when that project is completed.

Zoning has really picked up last year and this year. We approved the Inn at South Old State which is an assisted living residence across from Little Bear subdivision. We also approved the 124 acre, 248 lot North Farms Development along North and Shanahan roads with improvements to both roads. We approved a 16 acre, 24 lot Woods at Weeping Rock subdivision on Lewis Center Road next to Olentangy High School. In addition we approved the 130 acre Planned Commercial portion of the overall 288 acre Kerbler Farm development to be called Slate Ridge. This development includes the relocation and extension of Home


Road to the east side of U.S. Route 23. The Delaware County Engineer's office will be constructing the relocation of Home Road to the south of its current location to line up with the Slate Ridge portion on the east side with construction beginning this summer.

I want to thank the many residents who sit on our Orange Township Community Park Board, Orange Township Economic Development Advisory Board, Board of Zoning Appeals, Zoning Commission and the various community groups we have for the community center study and the Parks Master Plan. The many residents that get involved on our boards and groups show that our residents are willing to take an active role in our community and provide invaluable input; this makes it a better community for all of us.

Area Variances for Deck and Pools

Most area variances involving residential properties involve relief from setback requirements when residents want, for example, to build a deck, an addition to their home or install a pool.



When applying for a deck or pool permit, there are setback requirements that must be met. If the deck or pool extend into the setback, an area variance is required prior to receiving a permit.

When a resident needs relief from the provisions or requirements set forth in the zoning code, they can ask for a variance from the code as long as such will not be contrary to the public interest as determined by the township's Board of Zoning Appeals (BZA).

An area variance may be granted by reason of the exceptional narrowness, shallowness or unusual shape of a specific piece of property, or by reason of exceptional topographic conditions, or other extraordinary situations or conditions of such parcel of property.

In the event that the variance requested relates solely to area requirements established or imposed by the code, the BZA shall have the power to authorize a variance from the terms of the code upon a finding that literal enforcement of the code will result in practical difficulties and that the spirit of the code will be observed and substantial justice done.

How long will my smoke alarm last?

Most smoke alarms installed today have a life span of about 8-10 years. After this time, the entire unit should be replaced. It is a good idea to write the date of purchase with a marker on the inside of your alarm so you will know when to replace it. Some of the newer alarms already have the purchase date written inside. In any event, always follow the manufacturer's instructions for replacement. Batteries should be replaced at least twice a year, remember "change your clock change your battery" for daylight savings time.



Gypsy Moth Management Program

The Ohio Department of Agriculture each year conducts an extensive trapping program throughout Ohio to detect growing populations of the invasive species *Lymantria dispar*, better known as the gypsy moth. This insect does its damage by defoliating the tree during its caterpillar life stage. A couple of years of defoliation and other environmental stresses can cause trees to die. With over 300 species of trees and shrubs that can be affected, it is considered one of the most destructive insect pests threatening our forest and ornamental plants in Ohio. If left unchecked, gypsy moth infestations can grow quite rapidly. Therefore, it is vital to eliminate growing populations as soon as possible.

ODA has recently completed an analysis of gypsy moth populations throughout Ohio. Based on rising moth captures and/or egg mass counts within your area, we have concluded that a treatment is needed, so the Ohio Department of Agriculture, in cooperation with the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Forest Service / Forest Health Protection / Gypsy Moth Slow the Spread Program, will be conducting a Gypsy Moth Treatment Project during the month of June in your area. Aerial treatment(s) of forested areas infested with the gypsy moth pest may begin in mid-June, with a mating disruption treatment.

Does Orange Township construct a Community Center and what does that Community Center entail? In 2012 Orange Township conducted a Community Center Feasibility Study that concluded that there is strong support for a Community Center in Orange Township. Additionally, as we conclude the Parks, Trails and Greenways Master Plan 2013 Update one of the most frequent comments was regarding the status of the Community Center.

In November of 2013 the Trustees authorized the Park Board to proceed with setting up committees to work towards identifying and answering the Community Center questions. We have set up five committees that are comprised of Orange Township Community Park Board members and residents of Orange Township. The committees include: Advisory, RFP, Design & Land, Communication & Marketing, and Finance. These committees will be working hard over the next several months to gather information and solicit input from the public. The outcome of this effort will be integrated into a final plan, location and dollar amount that will then be placed on the ballot for the voters to make the final decision.

Over the next several months we will be conducting many Open Houses and Township meetings so the public can provide input into the Community Center process. We are very interested in your input and opinions. Len has been especially passionate when it comes to the park trail system. He promoted and assisted with a joint venture between Orange Township and Highbanks Metro Parks for the trail and connections into Highbanks, and has been a strong advocate for working together with Alum Creek State Park for trail connections into that park. An invaluable connection between MORPC and the Township for trails, counters and information, Len proved to be exceptional organizing volunteers to participate in trail counts, an excellent reference tool when applying for grants. Len has also been very involved in the pedestrian bridge which, when completed, will provide trail users a safe crossing over U.S. Route 23.

POOL INFORMATION AND DEFINITIONS

RESIDENT: You pay Orange Township Park Levy and you're in tax district 27, 46 or 58. You can login to Delaware County Auditor web site @www.oh-delaware-auditor.governmax.org to verify your tax district.

CHILDREN 2 AND UNDER: (Birthdates must be after (September 2nd, 2011), ARE FREE, but must be listed on the application. Do not count when choosing the pass category and fee.

DEFINITION OF FAMILY: Family Pass Admits up to two named Parents in the same household and all dependent aged children (under the age of 21). Parents must be residents of Orange Township.

GRANDPARENT PASS: Admits up to two named Grandparents in the same household and all dependent aged grandchildren (under the age of 21). Grandparents must be residents of Orange Township. Select the correct corresponding Family pass category.

YOUTH: Children 12 and under will not be permitted upon the Aquatic Center grounds unless under the direct supervision of a parent or other responsible person at least 16 years of age.

BABYSITTER: One babysitter can be added to Season Pass Application (at time the application is submitted only) as an additional person to the pass. However, all babysitters must be accompanied by the children without the parents at the pool. Babysitters may not utilize the pass individually. Babysitter must be at least 16 years of age.

SENIOR: Please include a copy of your Golden Buckeye Card with application.
